
WHAT IS OYEP?

Each year, OYEP collaborates with local community Elders and individuals to provide culturally safe programming. Additionally, Youth participants are encouraged to lead workshops themselves, sharing their skills and interests with their peers.







This past spring, we came in contact with the **Outland Youth Employment Program and discussed** opportunities and workshops that we could offer. We finalized our plans and headed out to meet with the Youth who were working in Mink Lake, Ontario. We provided Financial Literacy as well as a Drumbuilding and Bracelet-making Workshop. While the LHF team was there the impact this camp has had on the Youth was evident. Many of the Youth were eager to explain their role within the camp and shared the new relationships they had made while there. STEM WEEK AND TRADES WEEK:

Participants spend five days living on campus at a post-secondary institution, immersing themselves in the experience of student life. During this time, they explore a range of science and trades programs offered by the institution, gaining handson exposure to in-demand fields of expertise within the region. The program aims to inspire and attract future students to pursue these vital career paths.



2005: STEM Week is introduced as a major addition to the OYEP curriculum, hosted at Confederation College to enhance learning opportunities.





STEM/TRADES PARTNERS

According to the Conference Board of Canada, only about 1% of Indigenous students in Canada pursue a science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM)-related post-secondary degree, compared to the national average of 10% for non-Indigenous students. Through hands-on training and culturally relevant learning experiences, OYEP is narrowing this gap by fostering pathways to high-demand careers and empowering Indigenous Youth with skills grounded in both modern science and traditional knowledge.









































TRANS CANADA TRAIL

Trail building provides Indigenous Youth with skills in environmental stewardship and sustainable land use. Through OYEP's partnership with Trans Canada Trail (TCT), Youth develop career-ready skills, connect to the land, and contribute to recreational spaces that benefit communities for generations.



HISTORICAL FACT

2021: OYEP signs a Memorandum of Understanding with TCT to bring their 'Trail Week' experiences and more to OYEP participants across Canada.



FUN FACT

In 2024, 50% of OYEP participants named TCT as their favourite program activity — out of the dozens offered!

Thanks to the TCT partnership, OYEP Youth have built or maintained over 60km of trail across Canada.

OYEP to expand into Alberta, where opportunities continue to grow today!



OYEP's mining education and partnerships offer Indigenous Youth real-world experience and access to relevant job opportunities in a crucial industry. From the copper in our phones to the aluminum in our cars, mining is behind so many everyday products we rely on. We are thankful for our partners, whose support helps equip Indigenous Youth with the skills to succeed in this fast-growing field and build long-term careers.



HISTORICAL FACT

2006: As Canada's mining sector was experiencing a boom in global demand, OYEP made mining a major curriculum focus. This move helped position OYEP participants to take advantage of the growing opportunities in the mining industry.



FUN FACT

OYEP participants received an exclusive look at Kidd Creek, home to Kidd Mine, the world's deepest basemetal mine, reaching an incredible 9,800 feet below sea level, with the shaft bottom at 9,889 feet.



Thanks to new funding from the Ontario Innovation Network, OYEP has increased mining programming to focus on the critical minerals sector. This is a key part of Ontario's push to power a green and digital economy, both at home and globally.

INDIGENOUS YOUTH LEADERSHIP

OYEP's Management in Training stream encourages OYEP participants to develop critical leadership and mentorship skills by providing opportunities to oversee projects, manage teams, and guide their peers. Through hands-on training and mentorship, Youth gain valuable experience in problem-solving, communication, and decision-making.

More than half of OYEP's field management is Indigenous, many of whom are proud alumni of the program. For them, working with OYEP isn't just a job – it's a leadership opportunity that reflects the program's commitment to fostering growth from within.

Leadership Opportunities

After two years participating as Rangers, Youth can apply for Junior Management positions or Crew Leaders in Training. Here, they have the opportunity to mentor Youth joining the program. Furthermore, Youth can then apply as Crew Leaders, who supervise and mentor all Youth throughout the summer months. The final stage of the leadership progression is becoming a site Supervisor!

The 2024 season marks Neepin Cook's fifth year working with OYEP, after having fast-tracked to Crew Leader in recognition of her incredible competence, hard work, and sense of responsibility. Neepin is now at the University of Winnipeg, working on her second year of the Pathways to Graduate Studies program.

This past summer, Blaze marked his fifth year with OYEP. His journey includes two years as a Ranger, a year as a Crew Leader in Training, and two years as a Crew Leader. Currently, Blaze is putting his skills to use as a Core Technician for Frequency Geophysics in Thompson, Manitoba.

One of the biggest barriers to Youth participating in larger leadership roles at OYEP or across the workforce is a driver's licence. OYEP supports and assists Youth who show interest and dedication to the process in obtaining their learners licence during the program.

In 2024, seven Youth across Canada successfully obtained their learners licence with the help of OYEP.



In addition to the six-week summer program, OYEP provides opportunities and support to Youth all year round, to ensure continuity to success.

Participating in conferences, career fairs, speaking panels, and local community event enables Youth to speak to their experiences at OYEP to a wide range of potential supporters. By sharing their stories, graduates are helping demonstrate the value of the program, which helps OYEP to provide opportunities year after year.


